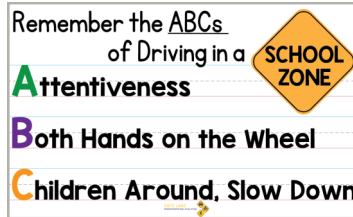


Walking, Biking and Driving - Back to School Safety

After over a year of remote learning and transitioning back into the classroom, classes at Fern Ridge School District are going back to in-person learning this fall. The Safe Lane Coalition (SLC) wants you to know that back-to-school time means preparing yourself and your kids for a safe route to and from school. Drew Pfefferle, the SLC Coordinator, says the SLC's goal is "eliminating vehicle fatalities and severe injuries caused by vehicle crashes."

The SLC is currently running an "ABCs of Driving



in a School Zone" campaign, focusing on re-introducing drivers and road users of all kinds to school zone safety. Those ABCs are: Attentiveness, Both Hands on the Wheel, and Children Around – Slow Down. Walking and biking students may be new to navigating our streets and those behind the wheel are responsible for driving safely – especially while in a school zone. Parents of students who walk or bike to school should practice their route with

September is National Preparedness Month

September is National Preparedness Month, which means it is time to take stock of your emergency supplies and plans. According to the City of Veneta's Management Analyst Cole Haselip, "National Preparedness Month is a set time to put a focus on security and safety. That allows peace of mind for the rest of the time."



Haselip says that wildfire is an immediate threat to Veneta and one where people can play an active role in preven-

tion by building defensible space around their homes. It is also important to know the wildfire evacuation system and what each evacuation level means. Be aware of upcoming smoke hazards and use an N95 mask if you have to be outside in smoky conditions.

Having a Go Bag and emergency supplies for any emergency is a good first step in preparation. Visit the City website under "What's New" at www.venetaoregon.gov, click on "Are you Ready for an Emergency?" Sign up for AlertSense, to receive emergency notifications via email, text, or voice call – staying informed is one of the first steps in being prepared!

them in order to point out safe places to cross streets and how to safely navigate sidewalks.

Understanding school zones and identifying safe crossing and walking spaces are important parts of this transition and parents of kids interested in using active transportation (cycling, scootering, etc.) should also be preparing their students for a safe route. Parents should teach their kids how to safely navigate streets and paths while on a bike/other active mode of transportation. This includes following traffic laws, knowing proper hand signals for turning,

and identifying situations where getting on the sidewalk and walking their bike may be safer than being in the road.

While information on how to take the school bus is available on the Fern Ridge School District website, parents may also want to teach their students how to safely wait for the bus. Learning how

to identify the correct bus, knowing where the bus will pick them up and drop them off, will make students more well-equipped to ride the school bus.

Remember to buckle up, wear your helmets, and have a safe and fun school year!

Fern Ridge Chamber of Commerce.

Flood Prevention and Leaf Pick Up

The City of Veneta would like to remind its citizens that Veneta Municipal Code requires residents to maintain their drainage ditches free of anything that may impede the flow of water. This may include garbage, natural debris, and/or seasonal plant growth. The flow of water through these ditches and waterways is the key point: overflowing drainage ditches result in flooding, and potentially damaged streets and yards.

It is also important to know that depositing any form of debris, including leaves and growth on sidewalks and driveways, in a drainage area or street is



a violation of Veneta Municipal Code Chapter 13.15.010 and may result in a fine. Veneta residents are advised to use their yard debris bins and proper disposal sites in order to deal with debris resulting from cleaning ditches or sidewalks and driveways.

The City of Veneta Public Works Department will start picking up bagged leaves that have been tied shut and left on curbsides starting October 5th. Leaves will be picked up on Tuesdays and Thursdays each week as time permits. Bags must have leaves only (no garbage or other yard debris)
