

Craig Soderberg Recognized as Volunteer of the Year

The 55th Annual Distinguished Service Awards took place on Thursday, April 13th at the Fern Ridge Service Center. A tradition that has continued for more than fifty years, the event plays an important role formally recognizing vital community efforts. The evening was organized by the Veneta-Fern Ridge Chamber of Commerce and hosted by Mid Lane Cares Board President Pat Coy.

Craig Soderberg was the City of Veneta's nomination for Volunteer of the Year. Since 2006, Soderberg

has served on the Park Board. He retired last year and his involvement on the Park Board has increased. He is spearheading the effort to host a 2nd Veneta Celebration Run and provided key leadership on the Egg Hunt subcommittee. Soderberg is Chairman of the Park Board and has served on the Veneta Planning Commission since 2018.

Preparing for Opening Day at Veneta Community Pool

Outdoor swimming pools are universally celebrated in summertime, and Veneta is no exception. The community pool is an incredible asset for a town of our size and has even proven appealing to people from outside the city. Nonresidents accounted for 20% of total pool usage in 2022. The Veneta Community Pool is scheduled to open for the 2023 season on Saturday, June 17th and preparations are well underway.

2023 is expected to bring a lot of pool activity, giv-

en that COVID-related concerns have eased up and reports from last year indicate a significant uptick in pool usage. Pool Manager Stacy Cornelius has been hard at work recruiting lifeguards and swim instructors for the 2023 season. It is important that swim instructors are thoroughly trained and certified so that they can support pool goers in a fun and safe environment.

Cornelius explained that recruiting staff is always a bit

Community Survey Results

Results from the citywide Community Survey have been reviewed and a final survey report has been completed. The survey was issued in January and collected the first week of February. 352 respondents participated in the Community Survey, which was designed to assess the overall satisfaction of Veneta residents in terms of livability, mobility, city services, and more. The City of Veneta released the Community Survey as a result of the previous Communications Survey, collected in August 2022, which indicated that residents wanted more opportunities to provide their input.

"People told us they wanted it, so we gave it to them. The City is happy to see that people took advantage of that," said Management Analyst Cole Haselip.

The survey revealed that 97% of people are satisfied with the overall quality of life in Veneta, and yet there is room for improvement in terms of things like economic development, job opportunities, and starting and running a business. Key components of the survey included transportation, parks and recreation, governance, safety, economics, and more.

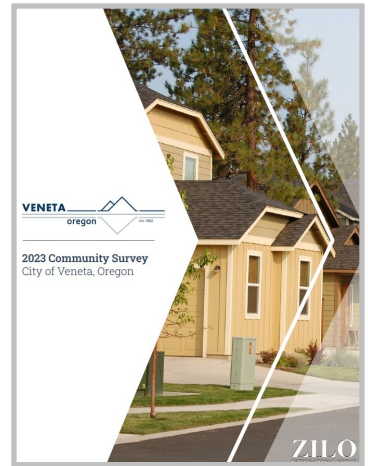
"We were happy to give people that opportunity to influence the way their community develops into the future and have an impact on the level of service we

provide here at the City. People told us overall they are satisfied, that Veneta is a good place to live, and provided their suggestions for improvements in certain areas," explained Haselip.

The Community Survey results will inform future strategic planning. This is the first year the City has conducted such a survey, and the next of its kind will come out in early 2025 and continue every two years.

In addition to the Community Survey, the City will host an upcoming Town Hall to receive even more public input on City planning and decision making. Responses will be used to guide the development of the City budget and two-year work plan. Stay tuned for more opportunities to be involved!

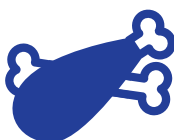

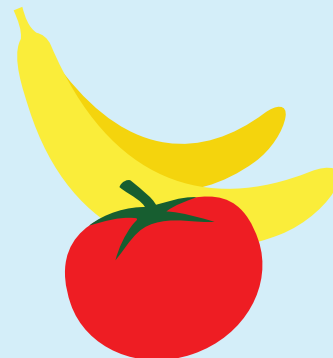

How to Start Composting Food Waste:

- Place a sealable container in a convenient location in your kitchen
- Toss in all food scraps and plate scrapings
- Empty your kitchen container into your yard debris bin, along with your yard debris in layers. There will be no changes to your pickup schedule

Kitchen Container Tips:

- Empty your container into your yard debris bin frequently.
- Drain excess liquids down the sink
- Clean your kitchen container regularly
- Shut the lid of your container and bin when not in use

Roll Cart Tips:

- Clean your yard debris bin regularly. Do this in a gravel or grassy area, not allowing run-off or debris to enter the stormwater drain at the street
- Sprinkle baking soda at the bottom of your yard debris cart to keep odors down
- Maintain a good mix of yard debris and food scraps in your bin when possible
- Store containers in a shady area
- Even if your yard debris bin isn't very full, be sure to bring it to the curb on every collection day
- Freeze or refrigerate food scraps until you dump into your yard debris bin



What goes in the bin?

YES: Yard debris, plant trimmings, floral waste, plate scrapings, meat, bones, dairy products, baked goods, fruits and vegetables.

NO: Liquids, serviceware of any kind (compost or otherwise - this program is for food and yard debris only), paper, oil, food-soiled paper (paper towels, napkins, etc.)
